STUDENT LEARNING

Teaching and Learning

Stevensville Primary School provides a comprehensive curriculum that strongly focuses on English and Mathematics. In addition to these, an integrated classroom program and specialist programs address the curriculum areas of

- The Arts (Performing, Media and Visual)
- · Health and Physical Education
- Humanities (History, Geography, Economics & Business and Civics & Citizenships)
- Languages
- Science
- Technologies (Digital and Design Technology)

Our 2025 specialist subjects are:

Physical Education

Physical education focuses on developing and applying fundamental movement skills, concepts and strategies across various activities, games and sports. Developing these skills enable students to participate confidently and support lifelong involvement in physical activity. From Foundation to grade 2, the focus is on developing basic fundamental skills and applying these in game situations. Students in grade 3/4 learn to apply skills and strategies in modified games and sports situations. In grade 5/6, the emphasis is on understanding concepts and strategies to use across various sports. Students in grade 5/6 participate in interschool sports in Term 1 and 2.

Health

Health education addresses factors that influence students' health, safety, relationships and well-being. Students learn about personal, social and emotional changes and transitions and develop a sense of their own and others' identity and emotional responses. They also learn to access and evaluate health information to enhance their own and others' health and well-being.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics)

The Technology aspect of STEM focuses on two areas: Digital Technologies & Design and Technologies. Students use design thinking to investigate, design, create and evaluate projects. The Science component of STEM aims to ensure students develop an interest in science and expand their curiosity to investigate the world around them. Students develop their knowledge of biological, chemical, physical and earth space sciences.

Visual Arts and Performing Arts

The Arts curriculum includes Dance, Drama, Music, Media Arts, and Visual Arts. During art lessons, students explore, create and present their creative ideas. The Arts provide an excellent opportunity for students to showcase their creativity and develop a range of artistic skills.



Language - Italian

Aims to foster a love of languages and an understanding and respect for other cultures. Students build confidence through use of the language in class amongst their peer group and in presentations such as assemblies.



NAPLAN

Grade 3 and 5 students sit NAPLAN every year in Term 1.

Students will be provided opportunities to practice various tests and learn the skills required to complete the tests effectively.

READING

All students are expected to independently read for **20 minutes** every weeknight. Students can record reading in their diary. Additional homework tasks could include unfinished classwork, Reading Eggs and any intervention program work. All students are expected to be regular library borrowers.

Digital Technology

At Stevensville Primary School, we focus on respect and responsibility. We show this through our use of technology and online interactions. We teach students how to use technology safely and responsibly, helping them to understand online dangers. We aim to give students the digital skills they need to make a positive difference. We carefully choose how we use digital tools in our lessons, providing engaging and personal experiences while offering plenty of offline learning opportunities.

STUDENT WELLBEING VOICE AND AGENCY

Student Wellbeing, Voice and Agency

Stevensville Primary School is committed to providing a safe, secure and inclusive learning environment for all students. We understand that students reach their full potential only when they are happy, healthy and safe, and that a positive school culture, where student participation is encouraged and valued, helps to engage students and support them in their learning. Our school acknowledges that student well-being and student learning outcomes are closely linked.

Our school has a Wellbeing Officer/Mental Health Leader who provide emotional, mental and well-being support for students to improve engagement and learning outcomes. Our Disability Inclusion leader offers guidance and support for students identified as having a disability.

Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships

Respectful Relationships education is a core component of the Victorian Curriculum from Foundation to Year 12. It is all about embedding a culture of respect and equality across the entire school community. The program is aimed to building Respectful Relationships. The learning materials are designed for primary school teachers to develop students' social, emotional and positive relationship skills. The learning materials include 8 Social and Emotional Learning topics across all levels of primary education:

- Emotional Literacy
- Personal Strengths
- Positive Coping
- Problem Solving
- Stress Management
- Help Seeking
- Gender and Identity
- Positive Gender Relationships.



School Wide Positive Behaviour Expectations

School-Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) is an evidence-based whole-school framework that provides the school with an approach to improve all student's social, emotional, behavioural and academic outcomes.

Our <u>Behaviour Matrix</u> clearly outlines the expected behaviours of students at Stevensville Primary. Clear, positive behaviours have been identified and displayed across the school, and every student has a copy of the matrix they can refer to. The expected behaviours are explicitly taught within the classroom at the beginning of the school year.

A values card system acknowledges expected behaviour and promotes commitment from all community members. Staff give value cards to students who display the expected behaviours outlined in the matrix. Students who receive a values card are entered into a draw to be acknowledged at the assembly. Weekly winners are entered into another mega draw at the end of each term.

Assembly

Our school leaders conduct fortnightly assembly at our school library Friday afternoons at 3:00pm. All parents, guardians and the wider community are welcome to join us.

Birthday Celebrations

Birthdays are important and parents are welcome to celebrate their child's birthday at school. If you wish to send party bags for your child to share with their classroom, it is recommended that there are no food items. Instead, items such as bubbles, erasers, stationery is preferred. If parents would like to send cupcakes, please provide a list of ingredients. If you wish to provide these items, please come to the office first.

Camps, excursions and incursions

Camps, excursion and incursions are organised throughout the year to enhance our teaching programs at our school. All students are expected to participate in these educational activities. Students are expected to wear their school uniform to our excursions and incursions.

Change of address & phone number

It is important that the school is able to contact parents or guardians at all times, particularly in the case of emergencies. Hence, parents must make sure they notify the school of any change of address or telephone number (home, work, mobile and emergency). At the beginning of each year the school requests all families to check and confirm the information that we have listed is correct and to make any necessary amendments.

Uniform

School uniform is compulsory at Stevensville Primary School. Our school uniform can be purchased from our school office. Please write your child's name on all their belongings.

School Hats

As a SunSmart school we have a sun protection policy that meets the Cancer Council of Victoria criteria. It is compulsory that all children are required to wear their hat from late August until the end of April. Please note: No hat – play in the shade.

Medication

Parents are asked to complete the MEDICATION AUTHORITY FORM located at our school office. The school is unable to administer any medication without written parent permission and does not provide medications for student use. All medication administered by the school should be in its original packaging. Some children need medication to control illnesses such as asthma, epilepsy, diabetes, anaphylaxis etc. In such cases, the school needs to be informed and a management plan must be provided to the school. Management plans must be completed and signed by your

child's doctor annually.

Mobile phone policy

Department policy restricts mobile phone use during school hours. Students who bring a phone, iPad or smart watch to school must hand it to the office at the start of the day and pick it up from the office at the end of the school day.
